



8 May 2017 First Diplomatic Gala Dinner in Northern Ireland is announced

The Consular Corps/Association of Northern Ireland (CA-NI) together with Co-operation Ireland our charity partner are pleased to announce the inaugural Diplomatic Gala Dinner to be held in Belfast later this year.

Co-operation Ireland is delighted to have been nominated as the beneficiary charity for this first ever Consular Corps/Association of Northern Ireland Diplomatic Dinner, scheduled for 12 October at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Shaws Bridge, Belfast.

The dinner is an opportunity for CA-NI to officially bring Ambassadors, High Commissioners and senior Diplomats to Northern Ireland to celebrate the increasing multiculturalism and diversity of Northern Ireland society. Diplomats from across the world will be in attendance.

Established over 10 years ago CA-NI, has members representing 40 countries with Honorary Consuls and including the United States, China and the European Commission with a full Diplomatic presence here.

Peter Sheridan, Chief Executive of Co-operation Ireland said “I am delighted Co-operation Ireland has been chosen as the charity for the inaugural Diplomatic Dinner. As an organisation, whose aim is to build better relations between the people living on this island, the aim of this dinner fits our remit perfectly.

“Over the past decade we have seen our society move from being primarily Irish or British to a society that is culturally and ethnically diverse and this is something we reflect in our programme design. We believe that it is vitally important that people feel welcomed and are able to integrate into all parts of Irish society, North or South.”

The Duchess of Abercorn whose own ancestry hails from Russia, will be our Guest of Honour at this black tie/traditional dress Diplomatic Dinner which will take the format of a Welcome Drinks Reception commencing at 19.00 with 4-Course Dinner, Guest Speaker, Ethnic Music and other entertainment.
